### Assistant Fire Chief Roy Gunsolus retires after 36 years

Mayor Armondo Pavone and City Councilmembers Ryan McIrvin and Ruth Pérez joined in saluting Renton Regional Fire Authority Assistant Chief Roy Gunsolus. Roy just retired after 36 incredible years as a firefighter, including 30 with Renton.

Roy started his career in 1984 in Kenmore before moving to Renton in 1990. During his career with Renton Fire Department, he served as a lieutenant (2005), captain (2007), and battalion chief (2008). After the formation of Renton Regional Fire Authority, Roy served as deputy chief (2016) and assistant chief (2020). He served as RRFA's acting fire chief from October 2020 to February 2021, before returning to his duties as assistant chief.

He's left an indelible mark on fire operations in our city. He authored command procedures, ran the Renton recruit academy, coordinated rope and hazmat teams, served as an instructor, and served on several county and zone

### The "Statue Stylist Group"

Four women scurry about three bronze statues, adding skirts and shirts, hats and ribbons. They're oblivious to the people walking the paths at Gene Coulon Memorial Beach Park, many of whom stop and stare. Instead, the group is focused on the task at hand.

Meet the members of the "Statue Stylist Group," who spent an hour on Wednesday decorating the Interface sculpture at the park for the Fourth of July. They're the third generation of Renton residents who've been turning Philip Levine's artwork into one of the most discussed pieces in the city since 1993.

"I admire the wonderful ladies who started this fun tradition," said Maureen VanderPas, one of the quartet. "For almost 30 years, they added smiles to the faces of those who visit the park."

The tradition started when three friends, "The Walkers," placed pumpkins at the statues to celebrate Halloween. In 1998 they started dressing them in holiday attire. The group also grew to a dozen members.

Since then, the statues have celebrated many significant holidays: Christmas, Valentine's Day, Apple Cup, St. Patrick's Day, Easter. For this Fourth of July, they're adorned in red, white, and blue.

Each outfit is sized perfectly to fit the statues. They also had the forethought to add snaps so the costumes can be used year after year.

But as famous as the statues are, the women who started dressing them have remained somewhat anonymous.

"They came during the early morning hours in the rain and the snow and all kinds of freezing weather," said Maureen. "They wanted to remain 'hidden' since they did not have special permission to dress the public statues."

That original group has ceded their work to a younger generation. The "Statue Stylist Group" has kept the tradition alive through organizer Joyce Ahn. The fact they have gotten permission from city hall allows them to be more visible.

"It's fun to decorate when people are walking so we can see their reaction when we've finished," says Maureen. "I think it adds a little joy to their walk."

They have also named the statues. Gene is the guy in the middle, named for park namesake Gene Coulon. Patty (on the right) is named for the late Patty Raphael, the instigator of the statue dressers. Marion (on the left) is named for the group's photographer and historian.

Levine's sculpture was chosen in a contest for Gene Coulon Memorial Beach

Park in 1982, shortly after the park's creation. Levine has works in hospitals, parks and schools in Seattle, plus Arizona, California, Michigan, Oregon and Texas, and even China and Japan. "Interface," though, is one of his favorite pieces.

"I just love it," Levine told the Renton Reporter in 2008." But, ironically, what

does he not love? "I don't like them dressing it up particularly," Levine says, "but as long as it's not a permanent thing."

# Renton voters banned the <u>sale and use of fireworks within Renton's city limits</u> (R4-5-070(c)97) in 2005 to protect residents and property from damage

caused by fireworks. Since its implementation, there has been a significant reduction in the number of injuries and property damage.

Citations may be issued for violations, which can be both civil and criminal penalties. Additionally, the sale, possession, or use of explosive devices such

as M-80s, M-100s, and homemade or modified fireworks is a felony offense, leading to criminal charges.

Some adjoining jurisdictions still allow fireworks, including Skyway and Fairwood. However, this will end in June 2022, when King County Council

enacts a ban on the sales and use of consumer fireworks.

# **EMERGENCY RESPONSE**



### High temperatures were not the only numbers Renton Regional Fire Authority

(RRFA) personnel kept track of over the last week. They also responded to emergencies caused by the unprecedented heat.

RRFA responded to 226 calls for medical assistance from Saturday to Monday,

59 false fire alarms, and 16 water rescues along the Cedar River and outside cities. They also answered multiple calls to extinguish small brush fires. All while contending with the same heat we did, but wearing pounds and pounds of protective equipment.

The city's cooling centers at Renton Community Center and Renton Senior Activity Center served 168 people from Saturday to Monday. Renton Technical College (RTC) opened a center on Monday and served 14 people.

Our thanks to the men and women of RRFA for their response during this record heat. Thanks also to our city staff and RTC staff for preparing and staffing the centers.

Fully vaccinated people may continue to wear masks if they choose, to show support for others who are wearing masks or if they want an extra layer of protection. Not everyone has been vaccinated yet, including more than 300,000 children and some people with medical conditions, so everyone should continue to follow state masking guidelines as well as CDC travel guidelines.

### What the state reopening means

Two significant milestones this past week in the battle against COVID-19.

First, King County ended its mask mandate on Tuesday. But what does that mean?

### Changes

No masks are required outdoors, except in "crowded outdoor spaces."

### Does not change

- According to state guidance, people who are unvaccinated or partially vaccinated must continue to wear face coverings when they enter indoor public spaces. This helps protect not only adults who are unvaccinated, particularly as more contagious variants are spreading, but also children and those with medical conditions that prevent them from getting vaccinated or from being fully protected by vaccines.
- Businesses can request or require their customers and employees to wear masks regardless of vaccination status. Vaccinated people no longer need to wear a mask in most public
- settings. Still, they may choose to do so based on personal considerations. Everyone, vaccinated or not, should continue to keep a mask with them
- when they go out. Masks will be needed in some indoor spaces.

means all industries previously covered by guidance in the Healthy Washington - Roadmap to Recovery or the Safe Start Reopening Plan may return to usual capacity and operations. There are limited exceptions for large indoor events, designated as those with more than 10,000 simultaneous participants in an indoor, enclosed space. Reopening guidance:

### Vaccine verification/negative testing: Recommended but not required

- for large indoor and outdoor events Capacity limitations: No restrictions in restaurants, bars, stores,
- businesses, theaters, etc. (except large indoor events mentioned above) Physical distancing: No requirements Facial coverings: Not required for vaccinated individuals, unless required
- by individual business
- Travelers: Follow CDC recommendations Some exceptions will include schools and childcare centers that will continue
- to have some facial coverings and physical distancing requirements.
