Council approves \$3.6 million in ARPA-related relief funds

On Monday, the city council approved \$3.6 million to support economic recovery and fund housing, homeless prevention, and human services programs.

The money comes from the city's \$18.1 million allocation from the federal government as part of the American Recuse Plan Act (ARPA).

The funding includes a \$1.0 million contribution to the Washington Flex Fund, which provides small business loans. The Washington State Department of Commerce will do a 2:1 match for all money spent if committed by October 1, 2021. Small businesses and non-profits can borrow up to \$150,000 and use it for general business expenses. The loans have low interest rates and no fees. The first year's payment is interest only.

The council committed \$600,000 for small business grants to support retail businesses in the downtown core disproportionately impacted due to COVID-19 and construction delays during the Wells/Williams conversion project.

Housing, homeless, and human services programs will receive \$1.5 million. The funds will assist residents with utility bills, rent, or other uses identified through the city's equity lens.

The council allocated \$500,000 to buy additional hardware and software to support remote services provided to residents by city staff.

The city's Finance Department briefed the council on proposed ARPA funds allocation. If you didn't see the presentation, we've included it for your review.

Recreation center and senior center to open Monday

Division staff has developed a safe re-opening plan that puts an emphasis on public safety. In addition, they are recruiting and hiring recreation staff to get back to pre-COVID-19 levels to best serve our community public.

State utility moratorium ends Sept. 30

The governor's moratorium preventing shut-off of water, electricity, or natural gas is scheduled to end on Sept. 30. After that, standard utility billing collection practices will resume.

This has been a difficult time, and many of our residents need assistance. If you're not able to pay the minimum past due balance by Sept. 30, please call the city's Utility Billing Customer Service office at 425-430-6852 to arrange an acceptable payment plan.

Comcast is awarding \$10,000 grants to 100 small businesses owned by people of color in King and Pierce Counties. They are also making technology and marketing resources available to eligible businesses in the area. The grants come from the Comcast RISE Investment Fund. The application window will be open from Oct. 1 to 14. Recipients will be

announced on Nov. 23.

King County launches \$20 million for cultural sector grants King County has allocated \$20 million in American Rescue Plan Act funding to

support the re-opening of the cultural sector. This includes large cultural organizations, science organizations, independently owned live music venues, and independently owned movie theaters. The deadline to apply is Oct. 18.

Award winners will be notified in mid-December.



Small business flex fund has \$100 million to loan

The state department of commerce is partnering with financial institutions and community-based organizations to lend \$100 million to help grow small businesses and non-profits through the Flex Fund. The money can be used on payroll, utilities & rent, supplies, marketing & advertising, building improvements or repairs, and other business expenses. Loan terms are 60 or 72 months with interest rates between 3-4.5%.

The Small Business Administration also increased Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDL) limits to \$2 million. In addition, an EIDL loan can now pay down commercial debt or be used for a deferral payment plan. Finally, there's a 30day application window for main street businesses.
