Councilmember Angelina Benedetti's term and service on Renton City Council will conclude on Monday, Nov. 22.

was appointed in February 2020 to fulfill the unexpired position #2 term of Armondo Pavone, who was elected mayor in November 2019.

Councilmember Benedetti

During her time on council, she earned a Certificate of Municipal Leadership from the Association of Washington Cities. The program recognizes city elected officials for accomplishing training in four core areas.



Councilmember Benedetti completed more than 30 hours of training to earn this distinction. Due to RCW 42.12.070 - Filling Non-Partisan Vacancies, her term

will end one month earlier than originally announced. Nevertheless, she looks back fondly and with a civic duty for time served on the council. "I wanted to be a part of the city council because it is one of the

best ways to serve our community," she says. "That has proven true, especially during one of the most challenging times in our nation's and city's history.

"Despite the obstacles, we were able to make significant gains in areas of critical importance - affordable housing, equity and inclusion, and transforming our public spaces.
