

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Last week, <u>Family First Community Center</u> (FFCC) reached another milestone: the building is now 100% framed.

Activity continues at the construction site next to Cascade Elementary School in the Cascade/Benson Hill area. Insulation is being added to the roof, siding is being attached, and sidewalks are being poured. Inside, electrical, plumbing, heating, ventilation, air conditioning, and fire suppression systems are in various stages of being installed.

Work remains on schedule for a spring 2023 opening.

When open, the center's partners and service providers—Family First Community Center Foundation under the direction of Executive Director Doug Baldwin, Jr., community healthcare provider HealthPoint, and Renton School District—will bring much-needed recreation, education, and wellness programs and services to the Cascade/Benson Hill community.

Baldwin's foundation will offer after-school programs; art, music, and technology classes; youth sports, dropin sports, and adult sports leagues; group exercise and personal training; health education, cooking, and nutrition classes; and activities for infants, toddlers, and children.

HealthPoint will provide medical, behavioral health, and dental care. In addition, Renton Public Schools will offer their popular STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) classes.

In addition, many transportation and financial barriers currently experienced by families in the community will be eliminated, making health care and other programs more accessible.

To date, approximately \$14.4 million in funding has been committed to the project. This includes \$4.4 million from the City of Renton, \$4.4 million in grant funding from the State of Washington, a \$3 million grant from the First Financial Northwest Foundation, \$1 million from Doug Baldwin Jr., \$338,000 from the MJ Murdock Charitable Trust, \$250,000 from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, \$200,000 from the Premera Social Impact fund, \$25,000 from Paccar Foundation and numerous grants and donations from organizations and individuals. The project's budget is \$16.25 million.

Proclamations highlight Indigenous People and Domestic Violence

Mayor Armondo Pavone issued two proclamations at Monday's city council meeting.

Oct. 10 was proclaimed <u>Indigenous Peoples' Day</u>. It's a day to recognize, respect, and understand our region's indigenous community, its long history, and its continuing contribution to contemporary society. It's also a small act of restitution for the hardships endured by Indigenous Peoples since the European colonization of the Americas.

October is <u>Domestic Violence Awareness Mon</u>th. Throughout the month, the cherry trees outside of City Hall are adorned with purple lights symbolizing the community offering support and resources plus honoring and remembering those who have lost their life to domestic violence.

In this country:

- It is estimated that a woman is beaten by her husband or boyfriend every nine seconds. In more than half of those instances, children under 12 are present.
- One in fifteen children has been exposed to domestic violence annually.
- More than half of abusers responsible for domestic violence-related fatal shootings were prohibited by law from owning firearms.

Domestic violence does not discriminate. It affects all economic, racial, gender, educational, religious, and societal barriers. Domestic violence systematically uses physical, emotional, sexual, psychological, and economic control or abuse to violate an individual's privacy, dignity, security, and humanity. For police officers, it's one of the most dangerous calls.

In Renton, we are working to stop the cycle of domestic violence through our <u>Domestic Violence</u> <u>Victim Advocate</u>. The advocate is available Monday through Thursday from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. on the second floor of City Hall or by calling 425-430-6654.

The advocate can provide the victim(s) with the following support:

- Safety planning and problem-solving
- Domestic violence prevention and education
- Protection orders
- Emergency short-term hotel shelter
- Food and clothing
- Transportation
- Interpreter services

Renton Film Frenzy premieres tonight

Tonight at 7 is the public screening of Renton Film Frenzy at Renton Civic Theater (507 S 3rd St., 98057).

Teams had 72 hours over Oct. 6-9 to film in our downtown businesses district and make a seven-minute-or-less piece of content that "reflects the personal style of the filmmaker, the values of the partnered organization, and the diversity of the City of Renton." Eleven teams took on the challenge and will be featured.

Philip Arnold Park construction starts Oct. 24

Philip Arnold Park will close on Monday, Oct. 24, as construction starts to modernize facilities and improve community access. The project is scheduled to extend into early summer 2023.

The project includes new restrooms, a walking trail, play equipment, and picnic shelters. In addition, the basketball court, parking lots, and drainage will be refurbished.

Funding comes from the 2019 Renton Parks Bond funds, Parks Impact Mitigation Fees, 2019 King County Proposition No. 1 Parks, Recreation, Trails and Open Space Levy funding, and local sources.

Our Parks Planning and Natural Resources division will oversee the projects. Their current projects page has more information.

State schedules Lind Avenue SW bridge repair

WSDOT has established a timeline for replacing the <u>Lind Avenue SW bridge spanning I-405</u>.

Replacement of the northern span will take place in the spring of 2023, with work expected to be completed in the fall. Until then, the overpass will remain closed to

vehicles. The pedestrian walkway will remain open until construction begins. The bridge was hit by a truck pulling a backhoe last June 13. So far, \$1.6 million in emergency funding has

been allocated to the project.





Recycle recap
